



John 1:6-8 & 19-28

Gospel Reflection We hear in this Sunday's Gospel the holy forerunner, prophet and Baptist John preparing for the adult ministry of Christ and asking people to turn to God. This serves to remind us that the coming season of Christmas is not just about the miraculous birth of the Babe of Bethlehem. The Season of the Incarnation will celebrate the arrival of the Saviour. First Advent and then Christmastide will show us precisely Who He is and what He has come to do. You might say that the Crib and the Cross are both made of the wood of the Saviour. We must prepare for the season of Christmas in the same way we prepare for Easter, by turning to God and turning our lives over to God.

Apostles Creed: I believe in God the Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth and in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, Who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; He descended into hell; on the third day He rose again from the dead; He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of God the Father Almighty; from there He will come and judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body and life everlasting. Amen.

Communion Antiphon: Say to the faint hearted: Be strong and do not fear. Behold, Our God will come and He will save us.

Act of Spiritual Communion Lord Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Holy Sacrament of the altar. I love You above all things, and I passionately desire to receive You into my soul. Since I do not now receive You sacramentally, come spiritually into my soul, so that I may unite myself wholly to You, now and forever. Amen.

The Great O's and Late Advent The keeping of the end of Advent as special days of preparation for Christmas is something that has grown and developed over the centuries. Anciently, the Sunday readings and propers were repeated on each ferial day of the week. Exceptions were made for the Feast of St Thomas the Apostle on the 21st December and for the morning of Christmas Eve, as well as for the Advent Ember Days. These days of prayer for those being ordained in the Winter were all Marian in their readings. It is out of these that our modern series of readings have grown, telling of God's preparation for Jesus' birth and the birth of John the Baptist.

The ancient tradition was to mark these last few days not at Mass, but at Evening Prayer, Vespers. Since the 8th Century at least, each evening a different Antiphon was solemnly sung at either end of the Magnificat or else at the end, on St Thomas' day, to commemorate the season. These antiphons all start with the word O and weave together words from the Old and New Testaments to hail the Coming Saviour.

This still the case today and life is easier because we now keep St Thomas the Apostle in July. We also us the Great O's as the Alleluia verses at Mass, though inexplicably the Lectionary publishers have put them in the wrong order. In Rome there were and are 7 O Antiphons. Other parts of Christendom had more. Medieval England had 8 and others 9 or even 10

Many of us recognise these Great O's as the verses of the Advent hymn 'O Come O Come Emmanuel', though they are all mixed up in their order. When recited in the correct order in Latin, they antiphons have a hidden message, for backwards they spell Emmanuel, Rex, Oriens, Clavis, Radix, Adonai, Sapientia - the Latin words *ero cras* are formed, meaning, "Tomorrow, I will be there".

The Year of St Joseph It is 150 years since Blessed Pius IX declared St Joseph the patron saint of the Universal Church. To mark this important anniversary, Pope Francis has declared a Year of St Joseph, starting on the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of his wife. Special indulgences are granted to the faithful throughout the year under the usual conditions (recent Holy Communion and Confession and prayers for the Pope's intentions). More detail of the Year's special celebrations will be published later.
