

**Second Reading:** 1 St Paul to the Corinthians 12:3-7, 12-13

No one can say, 'Jesus is Lord' unless he is under the influence of the Holy Spirit.

There is a variety of gifts but always the same Spirit; there are all sorts of service to be done, but always to the same Lord; working in all sorts of different ways in different people, it is the same God who is working in all of them. The particular way in which the Spirit is given to each person is for a good purpose. Just as a human body, though it is made up of many parts, is a single unit because all these parts, though many, make one body, so it is with Christ. In the one Spirit we were all baptised, Jews as well as Greeks, slaves as well as citizens, and one Spirit was given to us all to drink.

**SOLEMNITY OF PENTCOST SUNDAY**

**First Reading:** Acts of the Apostles 2: 1-11

When Pentecost day came round, they had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech. Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome – Jews and proselytes alike – Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

How does it feel to live through the world's longest lockdown?

We started in the middle of Lent and now we emerge out of it at the end of Easter! Today, is Pentecost, the coming of the Holy Spirit on the Blessed Virgin Mary and the Apostles. Pentecost, is a celebration which comes fifty days after Easter. Pentecost was originally celebrated by the Jews to remember the day the law was given to Moses on Mount Sinai. Moses received the law amidst thunder and lightning. Although Jesus had risen from the dead, they were afraid and did not face up to the world. They remembered the promise of Jesus that he was going to send the Gift, the Holy Spirit but they needed to pray: Come, Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit did come, they left their hiding place and went out to speak about the Lord Jesus. Their fear was gone and the insecurity had disappeared. Filled with the Holy Spirit, the Apostles spoke and proclaimed the gospel. Our faith teaches us to pray, 'come, come, come Holy Spirit. We must enjoy His presence, experienced His power and live the life he shares with us. Remember the day that you received the Sacrament of Confirmation which gave us a special strength of the Holy Spirit to spread and defend the faith by word and action as true witnesses of Christ, to confess the name of Christ boldly, and never to be ashamed of the Cross. Pentecost brings the Season of Easter to a close. After evening prayer, the Paschal Candle is placed by the Baptismal Font, reminding us that Jesus is the 'Light of the World.' Monday commences 'Week 9 in Ordinary Time.' With the readings come from 'Weekday Cycle Year II,' of the Lectionary. May the Holy Spirit fill you with His presence and empower you to go out and make the world a better place.
